What does all this have to do with Veterans Day? A great deal. Like many of those serving today, in Iraq or Afghanistan or elsewhere, I am proud of my service and glad for the opportunity to defend a great nation. Unlike them, I came back to a life of optimism, a GI Bill that helped us build a future, and an American people that welcomed us, because we were a united country. Oh yes, there were some that said we never should "fight England's wars" but they were few and they were scorned. The general public just pushed toward prosperity. Today's vets don't have that kind of experience. Too many of them find themselves homeless, out of work, undertreated for combat trauma. Many of them must be wondering why they volunteered.

We had 4 words that helped win WW2. The first two words were "Total War." Including the media, and Hollywood, and industries that converted from manufacturing civilian products to wartime needs. The other two words were "Unconditional Surrender." Roosevelt and Churchill set that goal and held to it. If a kamikaze sank an American ship, FDR did not invite Tojo to a peace conference.

We don't have anything like that unity or that resolve today, and we need it. Because we are in World War 3 and none of our alleged leaders wants to admit it. The extremists who lead the Muslim world now picked us for enemies. Some of them deny it -- like Saudi Arabia who extorts us for their oil. Others pretend to stay out of the violence because they subsidize terror gangs like Hezbollah and Al Qaeda and Hamas to do their dirty work, while they send their surplus population to infiltrate Western countries.
